I wanted to take a few minutes just to welcome everyone and thank some folks. First off, thank you to the staff and everyone who worked hard to get us logistically ready for today. A lot of work went into what we're going to get into here in a little bit, so I want to say "thank you" for that.

I want to say "thank you" to the membership of this committee. If you didn't think this was going to be work, I'm sure when you got the documents a few days ago to prepare for today, and saw the public's input schedule, I'm sure you came to the realization very quickly. It is going to be a lot of -- a lot of work, a lot of hard work.

We're going to go across the state and put our due diligence into what is a process that, obviously, only comes along every ten years. But it's a process that is incredibly important. And I have a tremendous amount of faith in every member of this committee.

It's a bipartisan group that is -- covers the entire state of South Carolina. And so I look forward to working with each and every one of you during the course

1 of this process.

2 Now, to get us ready for the road show we
3 have coming up, what I thought we'd do first is give the
4 opportunity for every member of the committee to sort of
5 introduces themselves, and where they -- where they're
6 from, so that you can see this is truly a statewide effort.

7 Representative Collins, I'm not going to
8 pick on you -- I think I will pick on you, if you don't
9 mind. But go ahead and kick us off.

10 REPRESENTATIVE COLLINS: My name is Neil
11 Collins. I represent District 5, which is in Pickens
12 County.

13 REPRESENTATIVE BAMBERG: Representative
14 Justin Bamberg from Bamberg. I represent House District
15 90. That's Bamberg County, Barnwell County, and Colleton
16 County.

17 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: Representative
18 Patricia Moore Henegan. I represent District 54, Marlboro,
19 Chesterfield, and Darlington County.

20 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Representative
21 Weston Newton, District 120, Beaufort and Jasper Counties.

22 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Representative
23 Brandon Newton, District 45, Lancaster and York Counties.

24 REPRESENTATIVE ELLIOTT: Good morning. I'm
25 Jason Elliott and I represent District 22 in Greenville

1 County.

2 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: Good morning.
3 Beth Bernstein. I represent House District 78 right here
4 in Richland County.

5 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: And I also want to
6 recognize a few of our colleagues that we have with us
7 today. I see Representative Hosey. Thank you for being
8 with us today. Representative Johnson on the back row,
9 thank you for taking time to be here as well.
10 Representative Gilliam, good to see you. And thank you for
11 taking time.

12 And I, of course, want to also welcome our
13 distinguished chairman, who's sitting over here,
14 Representative Murphy. And thank you Chairman Murphy, as
15 well as Speaker Lucas, for the opportunity you've given all
16 of us to participate in this process. Thank you very much.

17 All right. With that we will dive into the
18 work of the committee. The first thing I'd ask you to do
19 is turn your attention to the first tab. That is our
20 schedule. And, again, this is what I -- one of the things
21 I was thanking -- I specifically want to thank Emma Dean
22 for the work she's done on this.

23 As you will see, we cover a lot of far-
24 ranging places in the state of South Carolina, and she's
25 gone to extensive effort to make sure these venues are

1 available to us when we go out into the state.

2 I will tell you just a few things about this
3 proposed or tentative schedule. Number one, it is
4 tentative. We are still thirty-plus days out from this
5 September 8th kickoff in Myrtle Beach.

6 You will see a couple of the location -- or
7 a couple of the dates, while we know a general area where
8 we're going to be, geographically, we're not sure exactly
9 the facility we will be in.

10 So bear in mind, this is a tentative work in
11 progress that we will, perhaps, have to adjust as we -- as
12 we go along. But any questions/concerns from the committee
13 as to the tentative schedule at this time?

14 (Hearing none.)

15 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right. Very good.
16 Well, go ahead and use this as your -- to start preparing
17 your calendar. September will be here before you know it,
18 and we'll be kicking off in Myrtle Beach. I'm looking
19 forward to going down there to starting off our tour and
20 giving folks the opportunity to come and talk to us and
21 give us public input into their districts.

22 All right. The next thing I'd ask --

23 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: Mr. Chairman.

24 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Yes.

25 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: May I interrupt?

1 I apologize.

2 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Of course. Representative
3 Bernstein.

4 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: What's the status
5 on virtual attendance at the meetings? Are we going to get
6 to that? Or is that something we need to talk about?

7 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: We can certainly address
8 that. That's a very good question. So as we've all
9 experienced in this new era, virtual certainly is a good
10 thing.

11 It does not come without its difficulties.
12 And when I mean difficulties, you don't have to be in many
13 meetings or participate in many of them to see that there's
14 all -- it seems like -- and maybe it's partially my fault
15 as a technically unsophisticated technology person -- it
16 doesn't come without a price as far as the logistics of
17 getting it prepared and having it work sometimes and not
18 work other times. Again, that's user sometimes as well.

19 The thought on this is, number one, if you
20 look down at that October 4th, that will be the meeting
21 that we will definitely earmark. And you can see it's --
22 well, all of these other meetings are 6:00 to 8:00. That
23 4:30 to 8:00 will be the one -- there's a reason why it's --
24 - it's more than double the other meetings. That will be
25 our -- again, our last meeting, but will also be an

1 opportunity for if you couldn't -- let's say you live in
2 Chesterfield, South Carolina, Representative Henegan, let's
3 say you couldn't make it to Florence or Myrtle Beach to
4 participate in the public input; that would be sort of the
5 catch-all where anyone who couldn't get to the public input
6 meetings in person could sign up via virtually and give us
7 an opportunity to give input into the process via -- I
8 think we're Teams; is that correct? Yeah. So via Teams.

9 I know there are -- as I look around the
10 room, I know Representative Brandon Newton and I, we've
11 used it on the Election Law Subcommittee. And, again, it's
12 a great tool, but it does come with -- it works most of the
13 time. And it's a great tool to allow folks to participate.

14 So that is kind of the idea of that October
15 4th, to give anyone for any reason that couldn't be at the
16 in-person meetings, there's your opportunity to come and
17 participate in the process.

18 Any other questions?

19 (Hearing none.)

20 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right. With that,
21 let's turn -- I think the other item we're going to talk
22 about today is our proposed guidelines and criteria. That
23 was a -- one of the documents that you received in the last
24 week, in order to begin to digest just a little bit about
25 that, and then we'll certainly discuss it.

1 The criteria and guidelines in my research
2 doesn't really change from every ten-year period. As you
3 will see, we start with the Constitution of the United
4 States, through federal law, state law, all the way down to
5 -- you know, including the compactness, communities of
6 interest. These are sort of our guiding principles that
7 we'll be looking at in order to establish -- as we go
8 through this process, these will be the things that we'll
9 be talking with or asking the community -- the community at
10 large, when we have public input, to talk to us about.

11 These are the things that we have to go by,
12 so to speak. So with that, any questions, concerns,
13 issues? Before we leave today, what I'd like to do is go
14 ahead and adopt this so that everyone, in preparation for
15 our upcoming schedule, will understand that these are the -
16 - sort of the guiding principles that we look at.

17 And that's for us, for all the way when we
18 get to the full House floor, and certainly for the public
19 to have in their hands as they prepare to come speak to us
20 as to what's important for their communities.

21 So any issues with the guidelines and
22 criteria that we have?

23 (Hearing none.)

24 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right. Very good.
25 With that, I'll ask do we have a motion to adopt the

1 guidelines and criteria as submitted?

2 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: (Motions.)

3 I think I heard a motion from Representative
4 Weston Newton. It was seconded by Representative Henegan.
5 So with that, we'll call the role.

6 MS. DEAN: Thank you, Chairman.
7 Representative Bamberg.

8 REPRESENTATIVE BAMBERG: Aye.

9 MS. DEAN: Representative Collins.

10 REPRESENTATIVE COLLINS: Aye.

11 MS. DEAN: Representative Henegan.

12 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: Aye.

13 MS. DEAN: Representative Brandon Newton.

14 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Aye.

15 MS. DEAN: Representative Bernstein.

16 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: Aye.

17 MS. DEAN: Representative Elliott.

18 REPRESENTATIVE ELLIOTT: Aye.

19 MS. DEAN: Representative Jordan.

20 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Aye.

21 MS. DEAN: Representative Weston Newton.

22 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Aye.

23 MS. DEAN: Received unanimous result.

24 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Well, I'll be honest with
25 you, Ladies and Gentlemen, that went a lot quicker than I

1 thought it would go. You know, let's hope and pray that
2 the process is every bit this smooth when it comes to -- if
3 it's this smooth on the beginning, hopefully, the entire
4 process will be this smooth.

5 I started out by thanking the membership of
6 the community -- or the membership of this committee. Let
7 me also again thank you all. Let me thank the audience for
8 being here today.

9 I also want to thank the public who are
10 tuning in, and who we will get a chance to go visit with,
11 our constituents. We look forward to this being a process
12 that is transparent and open and, hopefully, one that the
13 public will feel comfortable and want to engage in, so that
14 we can make it what it is supposed to be and needs to be.

15 Also, I want to tell you, too, the website.
16 If you've been checking on that, we will be on -- up and
17 running today. The actual House Ad Hoc Committee website,
18 you can -- I believe you can access it. The easiest way is
19 probably going through the Statehouse page to the Judiciary
20 page and then to the Ad Hoc pages.

21 MS. DEAN: There's the Statehouse and
22 Citizens Interest.

23 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Okay. Statehouse and
24 Citizens Interest is also an opportunity to do that. So
25 with that, if there's no further -- Representative Weston

1 Newton.

2 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Thank you, Mr.
3 Chairman. And just questions -- and if I missed this, I
4 apologize. The total population numbers yield an ideal
5 size district of 41,278. Do we know when we're going to
6 get the district level and census block data?

7 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: So a very good question.
8 So the Legacy data, which I think if everyone's been
9 keeping up with this -- obviously, we're late -- we're
10 later than we want to be because of Covid. The census data
11 -- the Legacy data is, my understanding, should be by -- to
12 us by August 16th. That will be in a form as it was ten
13 years ago, essentially. That will be a -- in a form that
14 we can look at it and see where the population, how it's
15 changed.

16 Now, the actual final data that we will use
17 to make the law, so to speak, in order to go through this
18 process, projections, having it coming available -- let me
19 make sure I let you that right. September the 30th.

20 So, again, the Legacy data will be capable -
21 - will be capable of really understanding it. But that
22 final data won't be available until September 30th.

23 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: And Legacy data, you
24 mean the benchmark -- or the existing lines updated to new
25 population within those districts?

1 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: So look at it from a
2 technology point of view. Legacy data is essentially in
3 the form that was given to us by the Census folks back when
4 we redistricted last time, ten years ago. The technology
5 has obviously gotten better and improved over that ten-year
6 period.

7 That final data should be in an updated
8 form, but it's still -- via the Legacy data, we should be
9 capable of understanding where the population is.

10 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Okay. So the Legacy
11 data is our current districts with 2020 census information
12 reflected in those districts --

13 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Correct.

14 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: -- along district
15 lines --

16 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Correct.

17 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: -- with the new
18 updated population.

19 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: The current population as
20 it stands, yes.

21 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: On the most recent
22 census. Okay.

23 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: And we will be using that
24 Legacy data for the public hearing input process.

25 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Okay.

1 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: And then just so you kind
2 of have a bigger picture of the timeline, with that Legacy
3 data coming out in August, we'll be able to then engage in
4 our public input process September -- the final data coming
5 out, end of September. And that will -- and that will --
6 should allow us into the map room in October.

7 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: And that Legacy data
8 coming, will we put the maps in -- that information up on
9 the website, so that people are able to see this district
10 that -- in the last go-around was projected or had a 33,000
11 target population now is fifty-two or -- I mean, will we --
12 will we have that kind of information available and up on
13 the web?

14 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Via that final data for
15 sure, I would think so, there will be opportunities for
16 that to take place.

17 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Okay. Thank you.

18 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Yes. Representative
19 Henegan.

20 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: Just some
21 information. Ten years ago, what was the ideal population?

22 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Thirty-three-and-
23 change.

24 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: What, now?

25 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Thirty-three-and-

1 change.

2 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: Okay. Thank you.

3 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: We've grown. Any other
4 questions, concern, issues? Representative Bernstein.

5 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: With the schedule
6 of the hearings, when is that going to be published?

7 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: It will be on the website
8 today, I would think.

9 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: All right. And
10 so the public will be made aware --

11 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Oh, yeah. It will go on
12 the website today, would be my guess. We should,
13 hopefully, have the final locations for some of these dates
14 ironed out in the next week or so, would be my guess. I
15 would encourage the members of this committee, as well as
16 our colleagues who aren't on this committee but who -- to
17 get the word out to our home areas, that we're coming and
18 that it's an opportunity to participate.

19 Representative Bamberg.

20 REPRESENTATIVE BAMBERG: Thank you, Mr.
21 Chair. My two chairmen, Representative Weston Newton and
22 Chairman Murphy know it's not a meeting unless I say
23 something.

24 I just wanted to say "thank you" for your
25 leadership thus far on this. And I look forward to working

1 through this process with everybody on the committee.

2 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Thank you. Thank you very
3 much, Representative Bamberg. All right. With that, we
4 will conclude today's meeting. And we will look forward to
5 see everyone again on September the 8th. Thank you all
6 very much.
