2 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: And I appreciate you --  
3 your willingness to answer my questions. As the  
4 committee members probably already can tell, I'm  
5 against the alternative plan and would be voting  
6 against that plan when that time comes. And I  
7 would hope other members on his committee would  
8 follow suit. Thank you very much.

9 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Thank you.

10 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Mr. Chairman, thank you. I  
11 appreciate the opportunity to make a few  
12 comments. And I just want to comment, obviously,  
13 on House Staff Plan Alternative One. You know,  
14 being a representative from Beaufort County, the  
15 sampling of emails and testimony that we've  
16 gotten here was echoed throughout my private  
17 life, both at home and at the law firm, over the  
18 last handful of weeks since the testimony started  
19 focusing on congressional plans. And a  
20 resounding theme is that Beaufort County has been  
21 bounced around from the first to the second, back  
22 to the first and now it looks like it was just an  
23 attempt to try to shove that part of South  
24 Carolina somewhere. Which is often an orphan  
25 step-child mentality that gets taken certainly in

1 some of the barrier islands of Beaufort County  
2 and it was made pretty clear that certainly the  
3 residents of House District 120 as well as 118  
4 and 121, were concerned about just trying to find  
5 a home for them now. That the community of  
6 interest in coastal Beaufort County and in  
7 Beaufort County are aligned with those in  
8 Charleston, not only economically in terms of  
9 tourism but also environmentally. And I think  
10 that's pretty clear when you go back and look at  
11 the public hearings that were held with regard to  
12 offshore drilling and some of the other issues  
13 that have come up. So, you know, I personally  
14 believe that the alternative one respects the  
15 testimony that was offered about keeping Beaufort  
16 County in the first congressional district. I  
17 think when you look at the district lines overall  
18 it closely matches, as you -- you commented,  
19 subject to modulation based on population but the  
20 lines that have been previously blessed by the  
21 Justice Department. So as a representative of  
22 that part of the state, I do stand in support of  
23 House plan alternative one. Thank you.

24 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Yes, sir. Representative Henegan.

25 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: Thank you very much,

1 Representative Jordan. My only concern is when I  
2 look at the district map, it appears to me only  
3 one of them can be drawn where a minority can win  
4 and that is a major concern for me. And I went  
5 to every one of them -- the percentages of black  
6 and white is so much lower except in that number  
7 six is the only one I see that is a possibility.  
8 And that was -- and that's the concern I have  
9 with that. That's major for -- thing for me.  
10 Really sincerely I was hoping that we would have  
11 more so there would be more opportunity for  
12 minorities for run.

13 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Is that a question or a comment?

14 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: No. I'm making a comment.

15 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Okay. Certainly.

16 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: And therefore, the  
17 alternative one I cannot support either.

18 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: I understand.

19 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: Yeah.

20 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Representative Bernstein.

21 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: Well, this is kind of a  
22 question that I did not thoroughly investigate  
23 and maybe Representative Newton can answer this.  
24 Is there a way to put -- keep Charleston whole  
25 and Beaufort County whole and make that district

1           one?

2 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: I don't think the math works in that  
3           scenario. There's just too many --

4 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: That's what I was trying --

5 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: -- people -- too many people in that  
6           area of the state to -- to make those numbers --  
7           you know, just like again --

8 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: I mean taking out Berkeley,  
9           I guess, what it would have to be.

10 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: If you go back -- you know,  
11           Charleston split -- currently Charleston's split.  
12           I think we have a math problem as much as  
13           anything. Is you have a certain number of people  
14           and I guess you could split part of Beaufort and  
15           perhaps do that but you're going to end up with a  
16           split.

17 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: So Beaufort -- Representative,  
18           if you may recall, Beaufort was in the first and  
19           then it was put in the second. Then in the last  
20           redistricting it got put back in the first when  
21           the congressional line was done up in Horry  
22           County. And I guess at some point, I guess, the  
23           population is going to reach where the coast will  
24           need three -- three -- probably it will warrant  
25           three seats and depending on how far inland. But



1 as the chairman commented, I think that the  
2 population is just too much and to -- to take all  
3 of Beaufort and put with all of Charleston. And  
4 what it appears that this does is, you know,  
5 Charleston County, obviously, is split today but  
6 arguably the coastal areas of Charleston, their  
7 communities of interest, even though, while  
8 bearing the same name are pretty different than  
9 North Charleston. And I certainly am comfortable  
10 in saying that the community of interest of  
11 people in Beaufort County in the environmental  
12 sensitive areas is vastly different than the  
13 community of interest in Lexington, South  
14 Carolina. And they've made that abundantly  
15 clear.

16 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: It's just -- just carving  
17 out a portion of Charleston County to put it in  
18 district six clearly is -- the rationale would be  
19 because it is a majority minority district and it  
20 only makes it more packed. We're packing that  
21 district by carving out particularly North  
22 Charleston in my opinion on this is definitely --  
23 and you don't need to respond to that,  
24 Representative Newton. I was just -- I  
25 understand your concerns because of your

1 representation of Beaufort and there was some  
2 legitimate testimony about keeping Beaufort in --  
3 in the first congressional district. But I think  
4 it's also important that Charleston remain whole,  
5 and looking at those numbers, and to figure out  
6 what's -- what's more important. Keeping  
7 Charleston whole or Beaufort in -- at whole and  
8 the first. Thank you.

9 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Mr. Chairman, the split is now  
10 in Charleston --

11 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Correct.

12 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: -- is the same as brought  
13 forth in this new map, correct? Essentially?

14 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Essentially, yes.

15 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Okay.

16 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: That's correct. At the end of the  
17 day, this is always going to be a difficult  
18 process and choice of dividing areas. You know,  
19 we have 731,000 people and this isn't like a  
20 House district with 40,000 people or, you know,  
21 and oh by the way we follow the laws. Mr.  
22 Elliott has pointed out in this process a few  
23 times we don't have a deviation in this process.  
24 We're trying to hit the nail on the head. So  
25 getting people, you know, population wise in a

1 specific a way as possible is -- is -- is -- was  
2 always going to be a difficult thing and provide  
3 difficult choices. So Representative Elliott.

4 REPRESENTATIVE ELLIOTT: Okay. Yes, sir, thank you,  
5 Mr. Chairman. And as you correctly point out, in  
6 this process with the congressional maps, we have  
7 to get down to basically one person deviation.  
8 But, you know, as I look across the map and the  
9 different seven districts. Somebody, as you just  
10 said, got to be split somewhere. Greenville  
11 County -- the fourth congressional district which  
12 is comprised of Greenville and Spartanburg  
13 counties, both counties are split between two  
14 different congressional districts. So that does  
15 happen. It's not just unique to Charleston.  
16 It's -- it -- Spartanburg's in the fifth and in  
17 the fourth. And in -- Greenville is in the third  
18 and in the fourth. So that's -- it's just  
19 unfortunately, they don't -- the requisite number  
20 of people don't just match perfectly to county  
21 lines.

22 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Any other questions? Comments?  
23 Seeing none, is there a -- a motion?  
24 Representative Collins.

25 REPRESENTATIVE COLLINS: Chairman, I move that we pass

1 Congressional House Staff Plan Alternate Number  
2 One.

3 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right, we have a motion for the  
4 alternative plan.

5 REPRESENTATIVE ELLIOTT: Second.

6 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Second by Representative Elliott.

7 That will -- Let's make sure we get that right.

8 So this -- Yes, this is technically on S865. I

9 want to make sure everybody understands that.

10 That we're on that particular bill. So we've got

11 a motion and a second. All those in favor of

12 amending S865 signify -- with alternative one --

13 signify with saying aye.

14 MULTIPLE VOICES: Aye.

15 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Hold on. We've got a question. So

16 just to make sure we get this right and to give

17 y'all -- we've been out of school for a little

18 bit here. We're getting back started in full

19 session, of course, tomorrow. So we're -- this

20 is to amend S865. I called -- I think there were

21 four of us -- I was aye I recorded on that. So

22 there were four of those. All those not in

23 favor.

24 MULTIPLE VOICES: No.

25 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Two. So now that amends the bill.

1           So now we'll call the roll in favor -- or as to  
2           the bill itself. Does everyone understand that?

3 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: Mr. Chairman, for  
4           clarification purposes.

5 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Sure.

6 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: S865 is the Senate bill,  
7           obviously, right if it's S?

8 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: That's correct.

9 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: Is it right? And so we've  
10          just amended it with our alternative plan and now  
11          we're taking a vote on the amended version of  
12          S865?

13 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: That's correct.

14 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: Is that correct?

15 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: That's correct. Yep.

16 CLERK: Okay. Representative Jordan.

17 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Aye.

18 CLERK: Representative Bamberg not voting.

19          Representative Bernstein.

20 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: No.

21 CLERK: Representative Collins.

22 REPRESENTATIVE COLLINS: Aye.

23 CLERK: Representative Elliott.

24 REPRESENTATIVE ELLIOTT: Aye.

25 CLERK: Representative Henegan.

1 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: No.

2 CLERK: Representative Weston Newton.

3 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Aye.

4 CLERK: By a vote of four to two, 865 passes as  
5 amended.

6 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right, so now, we're technically  
7 on 4492 and let me explain that briefly. It's  
8 the same technical language. It's just giving us  
9 two vehicles in which procedurally once we get to  
10 the House floor, we have options procedurally on  
11 that. So again, it's the exact same language  
12 we've just -- or map or version we've just  
13 approved by way of 865. Does that make sense?  
14 Yes, sir?

15 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Mr. Chairman, so we'll need a  
16 vote to amend first?

17 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: That's correct.

18 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Just like we did?

19 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Yeah.

20 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: And then we'll need a vote to  
21 approve --

22 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: That's exactly -- I just wanted to -  
23 -

24 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: 4492?

25 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: That's exactly right. And so I

1 don't know that we need any additional discussion  
2 because we've discussed the nuts and bolts of  
3 legislation so at this point I'll entertain a  
4 motion. Representative Collins.

5 REPRESENTATIVE COLLINS: I move to amend H4492 with  
6 our Congressional House Plan Alternative Number  
7 One.

8 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right. Second from  
9 Representative Elliott. All those in favor say  
10 aye. Aye. All those opposed?

11 MULTIPLE VOICES: No.

12 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right, 4492 now amended is  
13 before us. Roll call is required to order.

14 CLERK: Okay. Representative Jordan.

15 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: Aye.

16 CLERK: Representative Bamberg not voting.  
17 Representative Bernstein.

18 REPRESENTATIVE BERNSTEIN: No.

19 CLERK: Representative Collins.

20 REPRESENTATIVE COLLINS: Aye.

21 CLERK: Representative Elliott.

22 REPRESENTATIVE ELLIOTT: Aye.

23 CLERK: Representative Henegan.

24 REPRESENTATIVE HENEGAN: No.

25 CLERK: Representative Weston Newton.

1 REPRESENTATIVE NEWTON: Aye.

2 CLERK: 4492 receives a favorable as amended.

3 CHAIRMAN JORDAN: All right. That concludes the  
4 business of the day. Thank you, ladies and  
5 gentlemen. Appreciate your time and effort.  
6 It's been a long road. Let's see if we can't  
7 wrap it up later today in full judiciary. Thank  
8 y'all very much. Meeting's adjourned.
